LigoranoReese Install 2,000-pound Ice Sculpture Marking
The Disappearance of Truth in an Alternative Fact World

Artist duo LigoranoReese focus on TRUTH in their latest temporary monument, "Truth Be Told". The massive melting literal ton of ice spelling TRUTH addresses a political reality where belief supplants truth. The work opens on the anniversary of Trump's inauguration and will last for days of steady erosion in the outdoor Chelsea gallery of Jim Kempner Fine Art, visible from the street 24 hours/day and streaming live online.

"Truth Be Told" is the sixth sculpture of the Melted Away temporary monuments series begun in 2006. In presenting these works the artists have discovered that melting ice is an ideal medium to depict the transformation of social values and semantic meaning. Previous works include "Democracy", the "Middle Class", the "Economy", "The Future" and "The American Dream".
